# Minoru Yasui's Legacy & Portland JACL honored with Activism Award

Oregon's first and only Presidential Medal of Freedom recipient, Minoru Yasui, has a deep legacy of activism that is exactly what we need to follow in today's landscape. Min is best known for his courageous stance against the discriminatory curfew imposed upon all persons of Japanese ancestry in 1942. He purposely defied the curfew so he could challenge its constitutionality. We remember this act of resistance by Min on every March 28, Oregon's Minoru Yasui Day.

After this initial act, Min didn't stop. He led a life of activism, advocating for justice for all. From his advocacy for Japanese American redress to his day-to-day leadership of cross-racial civil rights organizations, Min never gave up. Min's unwavering belief and action in uplifting all marginalized communities is his legacy.

That legacy is carried on by the next generation. Organized by the Minoru Yasui Legacy Project (and the Japanese American Museum of Oregon, the Minoru Yasui Student Contest offers students the opportunity to explore societal topics in connection with the legacy of Min. This year's contest theme is Human Rights Activism that Inspires. The prompt for the student art contest asks:



# The Minidoka Swing Band Concert

The Minidoka Swing Band began in 2007 by Robbie Tsuboi, who wanted to create a youth band to teach her Jr. JACL group Unite People about the internment of Japanese Americans through the music of the World War 2 era. The band was led by former Cleveland High School band director Larry Nobori. Their goal was to attend and entertain at the Minidoka Camp Pilgrimage in July, 2008. The band has stayed active under the leadership of Larry Nobori and Laura Baxter, who began managing the band after the untimely passing of Robbie Tsuboi in 2010. During those years, the band traveled to Japan to perform in 2015, performed at the 2012 National JACL Conference in Seattle, played at the Northwest Buddhist Convention held in Portland in 2014, and toured Northern California in 2019. They have recorded two CD's and were featured on the front page of the Wall Street Journal in 2010.

Since 2012, the Minidoka Swing Band has practiced in the basement of Oregon Buddhist Temple. They have been very active playing around the Portland Metro area, and as far as Eugene to Hillsboro to Woodland, WA, to Gresham. They continue to entertain and educate the public about the Japanese American Internment of World War 2. Under the directorship of Al Kato, former Jesuit High School band

director, and management of Elaine and Todd Yuzuriha, the band continued to flourish in 2024. Sadly, Al passed away much too soon last September, after having played with the band as our soloing trumpet since 2016. This has been a tremendous blow to the band.

The Band has a full lineup of performances happening this year in 2025! One special performance that is open to the public will be on April 4th, 2025 in Hillsboro, OR. This is a ticketed event and will be held inside the beautiful Walter's Cultural Arts Center, 527 E Main St, Hillsboro, OR 97123, Friday evening from 7:30 to 9:30pm. This performance is supported by a City of Hillsboro Performance Series Grant and directly supports the Minidoka Swing Band with a portion of the proceeds benefiting The Immigrant Story. MSB will team up with Unite People, led by Dr. Connie Masuoka, to tell the story of WWII Japanese Americans who were taken from their homes and businesses on the West Coast in 1942 and interned behind barbed wire in assembly centers, 10 concentration camps, and military prisons. ### Day of Remembrance

February 19, 1942 a date that is seared into the heart of every Japanese American person who was forcibly relocated to the interior of the country because of military necessity. Military intelligence found no evidence of sabotage which was kept hidden from the American public and not disclosed until the 1980's.

This resulted in over 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry being forcibly removed from the west coast and incarcerated in isolated places like Manzanar, Heart Mountain and Minidoka.

If there's anything our community learned from the horrors of our WWII experience it's that we can't remain silent when we witness injustice inflicted upon our neighbors. Another group of immigrants are being targeted and vilified. The current presidential administration has invoked the Alien Enemy Act of 1798, which was mentioned in the inaugural address, as a justification for arresting and incarcerating immigrants across the country.

The law permits the president to target these immigrants without a hearing and based only on their country of birth or citizenship. Although the law was enacted to prevent foreign espionage and sabotage in wartime, it can be—and has been—wielded against immigrants.

Now is the time to remember our history. Now is the time to show compassion. Now is the time to stand up for what is just. Never Again is Now!


